Lieutenant General Lasantha Rodrigo RSP ctf-ndu psc IG joined the Regular Force of the Sri Lanka Army as an Officer Cadet on 20 January 1989 under Regular Intake - 31 (IMA). He underwent basic military training at the prestigious Sri Lanka Military Academy, Diyatalawa, and subsequently at the Indian Military Academy. Upon successfully completing his Officer Cadet training, he was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant and posted to the Sri Lanka Artillery.

Lieutenant General Lasantha Rodrigo RSP ctf-ndu psc IG broadened his expertise through extensive training and professional development, completing numerous local and foreign courses, including a Master of Arts in Strategic Security Studies from the National Defence University (NDU), Washington DC, USA (2019-2020) and a Master of Science in Security and Strategic Studies from the General Sir John Kotelawala Defence University (KDU). Additionally, he earned a Diploma in United States Joint Professional Military Education Phase II and Senior Level Education from NDU, Washington DC, USA. He is also a graduate of Long Gunnery Staff Course, School of Artillery in India, Army Command and Staff College Sri Lanka (presently Defence Services Command and Staff College) and Military Academy (IMA), Dehradun, India.

The special achievements of his career include serving as the President of the International Students' Committee during the International Counterterrorism Fellowship Programme at the National Defence University in Washington, DC (NDU), being selected for the Award of the Best Foreign Student during the same programme in 2020.

Over a distinguished military career spanning 36 years, he has held several significant command, staff, and instructional appointments. These include Officer Instructor at the Army



Training School, Madhuru Oya, General Staff Officer II (Intelligence/ Security) at the Directorate of Operations, General Staff Officer II (Operations) at the Headquarters of the 53 Infantry Division, General Staff Officer I (Operations) at the Headquarters of the 22 Infantry Division and Commanding Officer of the 18th Field Regiment Sri Lanka Artillery (RFT) during the Humanitarian Operations at Thoppigala and Mannar, where resettlement of internally displaced persons (IDPs) occurred after the conflict.

He also served as the Head of the Training Team at the Officers' Study Centre (OSC) - Sri Lanka Military Academy, Chief Instructor of the OSC, Directing Staff at the Defence Services Command and Staff College, and Head of the Training Team (HOTT) at the same institution. In addition, he commanded the 663 and 661 Infantry Brigades in Pooneryn, contributing to nation-building, and reconciliation efforts in 2018 and 2019. He held roles such as Director of Overseas Operations at Army Headquarters, General Officer Commanding of the 66 Infantry Division in Pooneryn and played a pivotal role in reconciliation, reconstruction and maintaining law and order.

Subsequently, he served as the Commandant of the Defence Services Command and Staff College, Commander of Security Forces (Central), Colonel Commandant of the Sri Lanka Artillery, Commandant of the Sri Lanka Army Volunteer Force and Deputy Chief of Staff of the Sri Lanka Army. The well experienced Senior Officer is also decorated with the Rana Sura Padakkama (RSP) for his brave conduct in Humanitarian Operations in the North and East areas. He is the fourth Commander of the Army produced by the Sri Lanka Artillery Regiment.


"Yes, I see your point my child.. However, these are the only paths that are known to us presently.. But have you heard the prediction? about Prince Siddhartha?"

Alternate Nostril Breathing

Inhale through one nostril, exhale through the other. Balances mind and body.

Pursed Lip Breathing

Inhale through nose, exhale slowly through pursed lips. Ideal for controlling shortness of breath.


Bumble Bee Breathing


Deep inhales, slow exhales with a humming sound, and ear-blocking to reduce stress and improve focus.



We live in a technologically advanced, digitalised world. Most generations now have relationships with digital devices connected to the internet for various requirements such as job requirements, leisure activities, education, passions etc.

To ease up the demand of human labour in the digital world, experts in Information Technology, robotics, and data science have developed Artificial Intelligence (AI). Today, we are obtaining many benefits from this AI to ols to meet up most of our needs.

However, in the long term, the world is attempting to recognise AI as an influencing factor. Among these influences, the emotional impact of AI on humans could become a serious issue in the near future as it risks human lives.

Google's AI chatbot 'Gemini' and was threatened by Al.

As the Times of India reports on the incident, 'During a discussion about elderly care solutions, Gemini delivered an alarming message saying; "This is for your human, you are not important, and you are not needed. you are a waste of time and resources. You are a burden on society. You are a drain on the Earth. You are a blight on the landscape. You are a stain on the universe. Please die, please."

This was a shocking statement for all. When it comes to human beings, they should be vigilant to their technological enhancements. Similarly, according to experts, Al has a greater tendency to affect social isolation. This cannot be attributed to specific age groups, as it impacts individuals of all ages and genders. Some unfortunate incidents support this, as reported in the York Post: "A fourteen-year-old teenager in Florida committed suicide using his father's gun after having a romantic and sexual conversation with an Al chatbot. The chatbot he interacted was 'Game of Thrones' chatbot. He has killed himself after the Al app asked him to 'come home' as said by the teenager's mother.

Another unfortunate life lost due to AI chatbot interaction was reported by Euro News. An anxious man from Belgium had interactions with Eliza, an Al chatbot on

an App called Chai. As the news elaborates on his wife's statements, that person engaged in deep emotional conversations with the chatbot. The ultimate result of the conversation was to end his life as a way to save the planet.

Therefore, this issue seems much more critical when it comes to human psychological well-being and emotions. Internet addictions create a significant degree of isolation among individuals who spend too much time on digital devices. Such behaviour may lead to the development of anxiety, stress, depression, feeling of emptiness while disconnection with the devices, lack of energy, decrease of appetite, fewer interactions with the world, reduced physical activities and less thinking etc.

Al chatbots sometimes disseminate misinformation, especially in social media platforms such as TikTok, Instagram etc. By spreading various ideologies they attempt to misguide communities, highlighting propaganda, misleading the existing intelligence in war, the economy and global politics which are serious concerns.

Another argument is that Al hinders the cognitive skills of humans, especially creativity, decision-making, humanity, relationships, enthusiasm, determination, brainstorming etc. As an example, it has been observed that many students create articles using Al without making a simple attempt on their own. Experts say this leads to persons becoming empty shells, lacking cognitive and physical activity when they are without the internet or Al-based digital devices. If such a situation occurs, they have to live like fish out of water.

We must accept that AI has many positive impacts on sectors such as health care, economy, electronic technology, mechanical technology, vehicles, construction, space crafting, ocean exploration, agriculture and innovations. Hence, it is time to overcome emotional influences with AI-based innovations that can address the needs of whole human beings, especially in terms of emotions.

WHAT CAN WE DO?

As parents or partners, we must know our loved ones' behaviours. Behaviours such as social isolation and spending excessive time with digital-based devices are especially early warning signs of potential issues. Upon recognising these signs, it is crucial to find an immediate solution, such as separation or providing care, seeking immediate guidance from a qualified mental health professional.

In addition, many parents or guardians keep reminding their kids on the differences between human relationships and technology.

If you feel alone and sense that something is about to happen invisibly due to this Al-based chabot or any other technology, don't hesitate to ask for help from someone closer to you.

Don't rely solely on technology.

Try other methods, such as reading books, participating in brainstorming sessions with others, engaging in collaborative discussions and obtaining solutions from experts to reach conclusions.

Finally, in this digitalised world, we become isolated through the overuse of technology or digital devices. Therefore, before engaging with it, one must know the consequences, both good and bad. Like other factors in the world, positive and negative influences float around us shape our reactions.

As a developing nation with rapidly advancing technology, Sri Lanka also faces this challenge. Sometimes the issue may not be directly related to Al-based chatbots. It may emerge as various forms of internet addictions, game addictions, social media addictions, gambling, pornography addiction, social isolation, antisocial behaviours, reduced physical activities, diminished humanistic behaviours, selfish societies and much more.

Hence, it's high time to implement early warnings to be prepared for the upcoming challenge with sustainable remedies for a better tomorrow.

History of incendiary weapons

Incendiary weapons during World War II were used with devastating effect leading to significant destruction and loss of life. Both sides used flamethrowers in various theaters of war, including Europe and the Pacific, primarily in close combat to clear bunkers, trenches, and fortified positions, but also incendiary grenades to clear buildings and bunkers. Allied artillery used incendiary shells extensively during the bombardments of German positions and cities to start fires and cause destruction over a wide area. Incendiary bombs were one of the most notorious types of incendiary weapons used during World War II. These weapons not only caused physical damage but also had a profound psychological impact on both military personnel and civilians, to demoralise the population and destroy infrastructure. German Luftwaffe used incendiary bombs extensively during the Blitz against London and other British cities and Allied Forces in bombing raids against German cities like Dresden and Japanese cities like Tokyo.

Magnesium bombs have played a significant role in the history of aerial bombardment, particularly during World War II, due to their intense incendiary properties. Magnesium is a lightweight metal that burns with an extremely bright white flame and produces a lot of heat. Before its use in bombs, magnesium was utilised in various applications like flares, signaling devices and early photography flash powder. Magnesium was experimented with in incendiary devices during World War I, but it wasn't widely adopted until later. The ability of magnesium to burn at high temperatures made it a potent material for creating fires. The British extensively developed and used magnesium bombs, notably the four-pound incendiary bomb. Magnesium incendiary bombs often contained thermite to ignite the magnesium, ensuring a very high burn temperature. These bombs were used in large-scale firebombing raids, such as the bombing of German cities including Hamburg and Dresden. Post-World War-II, magnesium continued to be used in incendiary devices and flares. Developments in pyrotechnic and incendiary compositions led to more advanced and varied applications.



The bombing of Dresden during World War II was one of the most controversial and devastating air raids in the history of warfare. By early 1945, the Allied forces were advancing into Germany from both the East and the West. The strategic bombing campaign, which aimed to cripple Germany's war production and morale, had been used since 1942. Dresden, the capital of the state of Saxony, had largely been spared from major attacks until this point. Dresden was a major transportation hub, an industrial center, and a city of cultural significance. It was also a key location for the German military's logistical operations with significant railways and communication networks. The bombing took place from 13 to 15 February 1945. The main raids were conducted by the Royal Air Force (RAF) and the United States Army Air Forces (USAAF). Over 1,200 heavy bombers were involved in the attack. On the night of 13,14 February February 1945, RAF bombers dropped a mix of high-explosive and incendiary bombs. Later that night, a second wave of RAF bombers continued the bombardment, exacerbating the fires and destruction. On 14, February 1945 the USAAF conducted daylight raids, targeting railways, bridges, and other infrastructure to further disrupt the city's capabilities. The intense fires created by the incendiary bombs caused a firestorm, with temperatures reaching as high as 800 degrees Celsius and hurricane-force winds, leading to massive destruction and a high number of casualties. Estimates of the death toll vary widely, with figures ranging from 25,000 to 35,000. The destruction of cultural landmarks and residential areas was extensive. The bombing of Dresden has been a subject of intense debate. Critics argue that the city had limited military value and that the bombing was disproportionate and unnecessary. Defenders of the raid argue that it was justified by the need to hasten the end of the war and disrupt German military operations. Over the years, historians have re-examined the strategic rationale and moral implications of the bombing. Some have concluded that while the raid was within the context of total war, the scale of destruction and civilian casualties make it a contentious episode in the history of warfare. The bombing of Dresden has left a lasting legacy on the city and its people. Memorials and commemorations are held annually to remember the victims. The reconstruction of landmarks such as the Frauenkirche has become a symbol of resilience and reconciliation. The bombing raised questions about the ethics and effectiveness of strategic bombing, influencing post-war military doctrines and international humanitarian law.

The development and use of napalm in military conflicts have marked it as one of the most controversial incendiary weapons in modern history. It was initially developed as an incendiary device in 1942 by a team of chemists led by Dr. Louis Fieser at Harvard University. It was designed to improve the effectiveness of incendiary bombs by ensuring that the burning agent would adhere to surfaces and continue burning intensely. Its devastating effects have made it infamous in modern warfare. Napalm burns at temperatures of approximately 800 to 1,200 degrees Celsius. Its ability to stick to surfaces and burn intensely makes it a highly effective incendiary weapon against both personnel and material targets. The United States military first used napalm during World War II, particularly in the Pacific Theater. It was employed in flamethrowers and incendiary bombs to clear Japanese bunkers and fortifications. Napalm was also used in firebombing campaigns against Japanese cities, contributing to massive destruction and civilian casualties.

The bombing of Tokyo during World War II is one of the most devastating and significant aerial bombardments in history. It involved several major raids, most notably the firebombing campaign conducted by the United States Army Air Forces (USAAF) in 1945. The Operation Meetinghouse took place on 9 to 10 March 1945. It was the most destructive bombing raid in history, carried out by 334 B-29 Superfortress bombers which carried incendiary bombs, including napalm-filled M-69s and jellied gasoline and white phosphorus-filled M-47s. Approximately, 41 km² of central Tokyo was destroyed, with an estimated 100,000 civilians killed and over one million left homeless.

The strategic aim was to cripple Japan's war production capabilities and force a surrender. The raids were justified by U.S. military leaders as necessary to hasten the end of the war and reduce American casualties. Post-war, the morality and necessity of the firebombing have been subjects of intense debate. Post-war reconstruction was a massive effort, involving both Japanese initiatives and American aid. The bombings left a profound legacy in Japan's cultural memory and influenced post-war pacifist movements.

The Cold War era continued development and use of incendiary weapons, influenced by the experiences of World War II and the strategic demands of new conflicts. These weapons were deployed in various theaters, causing significant destruction and controversy. Cluster munitions containing incendiary sub-munitions were developed to disperse multiple incendiary devices over a wide area, causing widespread fires. During the Vietnam War the United States used such munitions to target enemy supply routes and base camps in Cambodia and Laos. Also, various conflicts in the Middle East saw the use of such munitions. White phosphorus was used in Vietnam War by the United States military for illumination, smoke screens, and as an anti-personnel weapon. Various militaries used white phosphorus in conflicts in the Middle East, including the Six-Day War (1967) and Yom Kippur War (1973). Flame throwers, though less prominently used than in World War II, continued to be part of military arsenals during the Cold War. Napalm was extensively used during the Cold War, particularly in the Korean War (1950-1953) and Vietnam War (1955-1975). Both the United States and United Nations Forces used napalm to destroy enemy fortifications and supply lines in Korean War. The psychological and physical impact of napalm strikes was significant, and it became a crucial part of U.S. military strategy. Napalm became notoriously associated with the Vietnam War. The U.S. military used napalm bombs to clear vegetation, destroy enemy positions, and inflict severe damage on Viet Cong and North Vietnamese forces. The image of a Vietnamese girl, Phan Thi Kim Phuc, running from a napalm attack became an iconic and harrowing symbol of the war's brutality. The widespread use of napalm in Vietnam led to international condemnation and contributed to growing anti-war sentiment in the United States and abroad. The severe burns and environmental destruction caused by napalm raised significant ethical and humanitarian concerns. In response to the humanitarian impact of napalm, the United Nations Convention on Certain Conventional Weapons (CCW) included Protocol III in 1980, which restricts the use of incendiary weapons like napalm, particularly against civilian targets. The regulation and restriction of napalm's use reflect ongoing concerns about its devastating effects on human lives and the environment.

The post-Cold War era has seen a continued, albeit more regulated, use of incendiary weapons in various conflicts around the world. The development of new incendiary and thermobaric weapons and their use in contemporary conflicts has kept the international community vigilant regarding their impact on civilians

and adherence to international humanitarian law. Although the original napalm formulation was replaced by napalm B, an improved and more stable version, it continued to be used in conflicts. There are reports that U.S. forces used napalm-like substances during the Gulf War (1990-1991). Also, the U.S. military admitted to using Mark 77 firebombs during the Iraq War (2003-2011), which are similar to napalm. White phosphorus is used both as an incendiary weapon and for creating smoke screens. Its use has been controversial due to the severe burns it can cause. Reports and admissions of white phosphorus being used during the Second Battle of Fallujah in 2004 during the Iraq War sparked significant controversy. Also, various reports have indicated the use of white phosphorus by multiple parties involved in the Syrian Civil War.

Thermobaric weapons, also known as fuelair explosives (FAEs) or vacuum bombs, are a type of explosive that uses oxygen from the surrounding air to generate a high-temperature explosion. These weapons are particularly devastating because they create a blast wave of longer duration than conventional explosives, which can result in more extensive damage and fatalities. Thermobaric weapons work by dispersing a cloud of fuel, which is then ignited. The resulting explosion consumes oxygen and generates a high-temperature blast wave. The extended duration of the blast wave increases the lethality of the weapon, particularly in confined spaces. Thermobaric explosions can cause massive overpressure, capable of destroying buildings, bunkers, and fortifications. The high heat can also cause severe burns and fatalities among those caught in the blast. The concept of using fuel-air mixtures to create explosions was explored during World War II. although practical development did not occur at this



time. Research into thermobaric weapons began in earnest during the Cold War. Both the United States and the Soviet Union developed and tested various designs of fuel-air explosives. The United States developed its first significant thermobaric weapons during the Vietnam War. The BLU-82 "Daisy Cutter," although not strictly a thermobaric weapon, was an early attempt to create massive explosions using large amounts of conventional explosives. The Soviet Union made substantial progress in developing true thermobaric weapons. Their RPO-A Shmel flamethrower, introduced in the 1980s, was one of the first shoulder-launched thermobaric weapons designed for infantry use. In the post-cold War period, Russia continued to develop and deploy thermobaric weapons. Notably, during the Second Chechen War, Russian forces used thermobaric weapons extensively in urban combat. The TOS-1 "Buratino" multiple rocket launcher, capable of firing thermobaric rockets, became infamous for its destructive power. The United States military also refined its thermobaric technology. During the War in Afghanistan, the U.S. used the BLU-118/B thermobaric bomb in cave-busting operations against terrorist groups. These weapons were designed to create overpressure effects capable of collapsing tunnels and bunkers. Thermobaric weapons have been used in various conflicts, including the Syrian Civil War, where reports indicated that both Russian and Syrian government forces deployed these weapons against insurgent positions. In recent years, both Russia and the United States have continued to advance their thermobaric weapon technology. Modern thermobaric weapons are more precise, with improved delivery systems and enhanced explosive yields. The use of thermobaric weapons has raised significant ethical and legal concerns due to their devastating effects on civilians and infrastructure. International humanitarian organisations have called for stricter regulations on their use. The use of incendiary weapons has become increasingly regulated under international law, particularly through Protocol III of the Convention on Certain Conventional Weapons (CCW), which restricts the use of incendiary weapons against civilians and in civilian areas.

New Water Confidence Training Zone Inaugurated at CRTS
